# NEW: FINAL CALL: Consultation regarding Harbottle GP in a Van Proposal......sorry, this is a long one!

Key Dates: Don't let this service van-ish!

Harbottle GP in a van: on Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> February deadline for your survey feedback.

All registered patients of the Rothbury Practice were supposed to receive a letter in the post explaining how you could respond to what is proposed but "already approved in principle by the NE & N Cumbria Integrated Care Board." If you didn't get one, then you weren't alone. It has been apparent during the consultation period that many, many people have yet to receive these and despite being warned about this consultation process discrepancy during the first drop-in session nothing has been done to rectify the issue. However, you have until this coming Friday to register your feedback.

   Should take around 10-15 mins to complete and remains open until this coming Friday, 23<sup>rd</sup> February. People reported that the link texted out by the surgery originally didn't work....it is now fixed so perhaps have another go. Again don't worry if you didn't get a text; again not many did.
- You can complete a hard copy survey these are available from, and will need to be dropped off at, the weekly Harbottle
  clinic on a Thursday morning or The Rothbury Practice or Longframlington surgery receptions by <u>THIS FRIDAY</u>. I have also
  left some hard copies in The Star, Harbottle.
- 3. All surveys need to be completed this week by Friday 23 February 2024.
- 4. So what have we learned so far from the two drop in sessions at the Village Hall (despite being advertised as being at the pub on some communication until the discrepancy was pointed out)?

### Van

- 1. The proposed van lacks a toilet and therefore patients will still require access to the hall for this facility.
- 2. The van has a consulting table, doubling as a seat, in the waiting room rather than the consulting room, so the waiting room needs to empty if it is needed. Still uncertain if the door between the two rooms is wide enough for a wheel chair.
- 3. The van would have to park into the middle of the road to enable the ramp to be aligned properly for wheelchair access when parked as proposed outside the current surgery. They can't change location too much as toilet access is required. Some have expressed concerns on the angle of the ramp for those needing to be pushed up in their wheelchair.
- 4. Not sure how viable having a reserved parking space outside the hall is for a Thursday van visit.

- 5. Wheelchair access into the van is only into consulting room and not the waiting room. So wheelchair users and their support will need to wait in cars/outside/bus shelter in all weathers until called.
- 6. Patients expressed doubts on the confidentiality of conversations between the rooms due to poor sound proofing.
- 7. The eco credentials of this scheme are doubtful as it is a heavy, diesel vehicle with a diesel heating system, rather than an electric vehicle.
- 8. It is still easier for a car to negotiate our local roads than a large van with an inexperienced driver, especially in winter conditions.
- 9. The van will need to be parked somewhere in the crowded car park at the Rothbury Surgery when not in use.
- 10. Access to patient records was confirmed to be possible by a system other than mobile/ Wi-Fi.

### **Finances**

- 11. The van finances have yet to be broken down for the public regarding a sound business plan for hiring out on the days it isn't in Harbottle. The proposal relies on other NHS departments wanting to hire it and staffing availability. A bit cart before the horse...Harbottle essentially giving up its Surgery building to fund an idea that has yet to be proven. Looks like we are Guinea pigs.
- 12. The claim of cost neutrality depends entirely on the van being hired out. Annual village hall rental is a lot cheaper than van rental. The cost of nurse, GP, equipment, consumables are the same whichever set up is used, although time wasted setting and closing down the van by a health professional could be better spent.
- 13. Longframlington, as a satellite surgery of Rothbury, is not facing the same fate because it has a different type of contract and therefore the funding model is different. So why can't we have that type of contract?
- 14. The proposal is for the van to be rented rather than purchased outright, at a cost of approximately £53,000 per annum inclusive of vat, insurance and servicing (mobile data access extra). The quoted cost, £11,000 per annum, of what NPC pays for the Harbottle surgery inclusive of hall rent, insurance, utilities etc. appears to be an absolute bargain in comparison, and left many questioning the cost neutrality claim for this proposal plus, that is one heck of a shortfall to be made up by renting the van out, especially when no one is yet lined up...perhaps it should actually be moonlighting as a hipster coffee/fish and chip van to make up the shortfall?!

### The Plan

- 15. Harbottle gives up its bricks and mortar, purposefully refurnished set up for communities quite probably outside of the Coquet Valley but under the wider Primary Care umbrella.
- 16. The number using the surgery is reported as 400....it used to be over 800 before Dr Miah left. This was quite surprising when the paper version of the newsletter used to be delivered to approximately 350 households.
- 17. The only example provided of a van being used to deliver GP services in the region was to violent patients and so no persuasive evidence of successful delivery to rural areas for patients with possibly more diverse needs as in Primary Practice....young, elderly, infirm, ability etc.
- 18. Patients suggested that if extra clinics, district nurses, chiropody, physio, vaccinations etc. are needed and are so keen to be provided by the NHS, then it would be welcomed and supported as they could be set up in the warm, confidential surroundings of Harbottle Surgery or The Rothbury Practice which is actually based within a recently built community hospital....and not put them in a travelling van! Village halls are also useful resources if in-village clinics are required.
- 19. It is yet to be clarified if the current arrangement regarding prescription drop offs can continue.
- 20. The current contract with Rothbury Practice runs out in 2027....so what then?

# **Community Need & Sense of Worth**

- 21. Other local areas are getting brand new GP Surgeries but we are getting downgraded to a van. Gives wrong message to the worth of local patients. Not Happy.
- 22. The van was considered by attendees to be a poor use of money when there is a perfectly equipped bricks and mortar building already in place that is underutilised due to NHS decisions rather than the wishes of local people, who through this consultation appear to be calling for more local contact hours rather than being forced down to Rothbury more and more. People working locally prefer the ease of dropping in locally rather than being forced to drive yet again to Rothbury due to the time wasted during work /school hours.

- 23. The current set up indirectly helps to sustain fitness, mental health and wellbeing in the rural community through rental to the hall, which in turn can provide yoga, dance, sport and social occasions to an isolated area.
- 24. The plan threatens the loss of a valuable rural community asset that attracts people to the area to live and work. Continued presence of surgery helps sustain rural living, especially when there is a lack of daily public transport.
- 25. The community was promised a sustainable solution last time....and yet here we are again. How long before the van becomes too costly to rent and this is closure by the back door?
- 26. There is a lack of trust in the system. History of broken promises each time we had a change of GP. Also local resident GPs at those times were refused opportunities to take up contracts as it didn't fit the models preferred by NHS, and yet it has always resulted in a reduction in the level of service available. It was supposed to be a sustainable solution and out of the blue a van is proposed.

### **Staffing Concerns**

- 27. Support was expressed by attendees for the care provided by the Rothbury Practice staff, they were fully endorsed; this is about the proposal and not the care.
- 28. The plan does not have provision for a receptionist to answer any questions and enables a clinic to progress smoothly. It also means a loss of the local hours of work for a receptionist.
- 29. Proposal expects the nurse or GP on duty to drive/set up/dismantle the van which we suspect isn't the most cost effective way to use their valuable time. Will it cause rota issues if people are not able/willing to drive a large van? What happens during the holiday period?
- 30. Is a substitute vehicle available should there be a breakdown/accident etc.? Should the van not arrive, will all lost clinic hours be made up to the specified <u>8 hours per week</u> already contracted for?

As consultation closes this week it then all goes behind closed doors for decisions to be made by many people who do not live locally. We have asked that the Parish Council is kept informed of proceedings.

We were promised back in 2015: "NHS England's main priority is to ensure patients have access to high quality GP services," And now just a few years later they think a van is adequate for our local primary care.

Also in 2015: NHS England said it needed to "secure a service which is really sustainable."

Commissioning director at the time, Christine Keen, said: "We're very keen that we don't find ourselves, or the patients in this area don't find themselves, in this position again."

And yet as Harbottle area patients we are again facing unwanted change that is a poor substitute, especially after many hundreds of thousands of pounds were spent on a wonderful little, local surgery that has the capacity for so much more. We have repeatedly over the years had to endure reductions in service from 5 days a week to 3/4 days a week, then down to 1 day a week with alternating GP or nurse options since 2015.

- Do you value having a non-mobile surgery in Harbottle?
- Does this van proposal satisfactorily meet your needs now and in the future?
- Is it the high quality, sustainable service that we were promised last time?
- Is it the high quality service that patients elsewhere can access?

If you have thoughts on the proposal, or current level of provision etc. please take part in the process. Once lost it won't return. There may come a time when a local surgery is what you need instead of facing the prospect of how you can get to one ten miles away in Rothbury. Please take part.



# Update on EES / ETIAS and Travelling to EU in 2024:

This is a much delayed scheme and is now scheduled to be operational from early October 2024 for EES and mid 2025 for ETIAS.

Citizens from the UK will be required to complete an ETIAS application prior to boarding an aircraft, sea carrier, or coach vehicle for Europe, and this includes travellers who will only be transiting in Europe en route to other destinations. British citizens can expect their ETIAS application to normally be processed and approved within minutes, and the authorisation is sent by email in the form of a PDF document. There is no need to print or present any documents as the ETIAS is stored electronically against the passport details.

# **Landlines are changing**

Many of you will have received leaflets from the likes of BT regarding the "Digital Voice" changeover, which means that the old copper landline services are changing. You can still have a landline in your home but the technology that powers it will be different. You should be able to keep your old landline number. Most existing (digital) handsets should work, but if they don't your provider can advise. You shouldn't face any extra costs for the service itself.

However, aspects to note:

- a) It won't work if there is a power cut as they need electricity to function. They are relying on you having a mobile phone <u>and</u> signal as back up in such circumstances.
- b) There is a possibilty of the providers offering a "resilience solution" of a free battery pack for the landline connection in these power failure situations for certain individuals....however as our area can have power outages for days at a time there is some concern as to actually how resilient this offer is in reality. They are currently offering up to an hour of back up.
- c) These new digital landlines use your internet connection to make and receive calls. So, they are relying on you having a (reliable) internet connection at home. However, your phone network provider is able to provide you with a connection to support this new system at NO EXTRA COST to yourself if you don't already have an internet router.
- d) Hiccups and serious incidents have already occurred nationwide and so back in December 2023 BT and other providers agreed to pause their forced roll out of these new digital landlines.
- e) So if you are concerned by any of the above, fall into any of the categories below or don't wish to be changed over automatically then PLEASE INFORM YOUR PROVIDER THAT YOU WISH TO RETAIN YOUR CURRENT COPPER LANDLINE. The BT contact number is 0330 1234 150:
- Are 75 and over.
- Consider yourself to have some additional needs eg medical need, possibly isolated, single and feel vulnerable, medical issue that needs access to 999 quickly etc.
- Only have a landline and no broadband.
- Need of (or possibly will need in near future) a telecare personal safety alarm (ie those alarms worn around the neck and wrist in case of falls or personal emergency). Telecare systems do work with digital landlines BUT a power cut or internet drop out can cause them to fail.
- People with no mobile signal at home.
- People with no mobile phone at home.

AGEUK WARNED: Be aware of scam doorstep visitors or even phone or email messages trying to get you to part with your money. Perhaps check with current provider or neighbours first.

Please can everyone make sure their more vulnerable neighbours are aware that they don't have to do this and a simple phone call to the provider to stop this is all that is needed at present. Why not help them make that call if it helps to alleviate worry and anxiety? Thank you.

# Some Ideas for the Coming Weeks

# **NEW:** Cragend Farm: Mental Wellbeing in Coquetdale Northumberland



Cragend Farm is the latest example of a growing faith in the healing powers of heritage buildings. For in the same way that walks through Britain's forests are now being prescribed as an effective way to help counteract anxiety and stress, so the conservation trusts and charities of the heritage industry are starting to promote the power of ruins and historic buildings to improve mental wellbeing.

"It is a common theme we get back from all our tour visitors and guests," said Lou Renwick, of Cragend Grange, who with her family have rescued, restored and now give tours of these significant historic buildings, with holiday accommodation also available. "So many say how much calmer they feel. It is so appropriate that we can use Cragend Farm for these experiences, because it is a place that has such a strong sense of nurturing about it, historically with farming practices, and with Lord Armstrong using this site as a place to show how he could help the farming community with his innovations, and housing his prize herd of cattle here."

With its creamy stone walls and pillowed cobbled walkways Cragend Farm is a site like no other in the world. It is truly unique, thanks to the philanthropic Victorian inventor, Lord Armstrong of Cragside. In the centuries that have passed since agricultural labourers of Northumberland were first welcomed under its roofs, when it was a place to work and earn their daily bread, the farm has been steeped in history from is early origins of Iron Age settlers to the Victorian era of great innovation.

We use the buildings as a resource for historical tours and local research, and each year we also offer a free visit though competitions and through Heritage Open Days. We also raise funds for local community projects through our tours.

Cragend Farm, (Listed Grade II\* Historic England site No 1153196) is thrilled that people are exploring the therapeutic side of their properties, with natural healing and contemplation, or forest bathing, now being prescribed by some doctors treating depression.

Historic England has also found that visits to historic towns, ancient places of worship and archaeological sites have the same beneficial effects on blood pressure and general wellbeing as social sporting activity.

Research by University College London five years ago was among the first to make the link between heritage sites and mental wellness. It showed that contact with a heritage site, whether as a visitor or a volunteer, frequently improved mood and even promoted a sense of citizenship among isolated and disadvantaged groups.

Britain's local authorities have been encouraging families to visit nearby museums, stately homes and historic sites as a healthy way to break the repetitive pattern of work, shopping and domestic chores.

While a period of respite in a beautiful castle or folly would probably benefit anyone, Lou Renwick believes that offering a moment "out of time", with no distractions, phone or television, is always destined to be a haven of peace and healing, and a visit to Cragend Farm is the perfect tonic.

# Look after yourselves.

The UCRG has been established over 20 years as a registered charity. We promote the benefit of the inhabitants of the Upper Coquetdale area, consisting of the parishes of Netherton & Biddlestone, Harbottle, Hepple & Alwinton. The charity provides facilities in the interest of social welfare for recreation and other leisure time occupations. Throughout the pandemic we were able to continue with our community newsletter in electronic form enabling isolated communities to keep in touch, and renewed batteries and consumables for the Alwinton & Netherton defibrillators in 2021.

In 2022 we funded the provision of a defibrillator in Harbottle village at a cost of £1510 plus the cost of several first aid/defibrillator training courses open to anyone in the local parishes. In 2023 we have recently assisted with the training of members of the local Archery Club and again run a free First Aid Course for 7 locals. We are collecting names already for the next one. So if you are interested be it for personal or work purposes then please get in touch. They usually run in June but can be scheduled for earlier if sufficient numbers allow. Each course can accommodate 10-12 people. The certificate also looks good on Personal Statements and Job Applications for older teenagers.

If you experience a power cut, the easiest way to report and access the latest information is via our website <a href="https://www.northernpowergrid.com/power-cuts">www.northernpowergrid.com/power-cuts</a>. Alternatively, our teams are here for you 24/7 by calling 105.

# Power cut advice and tips include:

- Bookmark Northern Powergrid's online power cut map and reporting service on your mobile devices www.northernpowergrid.com/power-cuts
- Have a charged mobile phone with important numbers saved, including 105, the free national power cut phone
  line
- Turn off electrical appliances at the socket (this is particularly important for heating or cooking appliances as your power could be restored at any time and potentially cause a safety hazard).
- Keep one light switched on so you know when power is restored.
- Keep a battery-operated or wind-up torch handy they're much safer than candles.
- Check on your elderly or sick neighbours and relatives.
- Ensure you have warm clothing and blankets handy and some food and drink in your home that does not require
  electricity to heat or prepare it.
- Call 999 in the event of a medical emergency.

If you have additional needs due to your medical or personal circumstances, and are not part of our Priority Services Membership, you should consider joining for **free** by visiting <u>Priority Services Membership</u> or <u>calling 0800 169</u>

2996. This will help us to support you during a power cut. This will include regular updates on the situation and consideration of any need for provision of hot food and alternative accommodation.

Those who can join include customers:

- Of pensionable age
- Who have a hearing or visual impairment
- Who have additional communication needs
- Who are in a vulnerable situation

- Who have young children at home
- Who are disabled, chronically sick, or have a longterm medical condition

Please remember to check on neighbours, friends and family members who may need additional support.

# **CIVIL EMERGENCIES PLAN FOR HARBOTTLE PARISH**

<u>Emergencies</u> resulting in loss of power, telephone, mobile telephone, water.

Damage to property

# In the Event of Electricity Failure

The Emergency Hub at the Star Inn will come into operation in the event of a long power outage, especially if there is no indication when power will be restored.

A varied response will be needed according to the emergency, but as a general rule:

Loss of power overnight: Emergency hub will open up in the morning and remain open as long as needed.

**Loss of power during the day:** Emergency hub will open late afternoon/early evening to provide hot food, drinks and hot water.

A sign will be placed outside the Star to indicate that the Hub is open and we will endeavour to spread information by word of mouth or telephone if they are working.
